Our **2006 morning program** begins Monday, June 19th. The pool schedule is as follows:

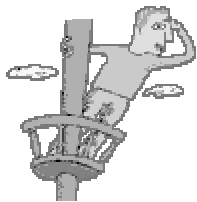
Mondays:	Crews Nest

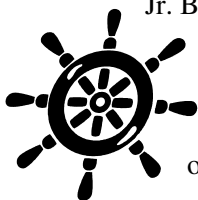
MEET YOUR 2006 SAILING INSTRUCTORS

All three of our full time instructors are USSAILING Level 1 certified instructors and have current CPR and First Aid certification.

Patrick Mooney is returning for his 5th season as a sail instructor at Put-in-Bay. Pat has been at Put-in-Bay every summer of his life, and has been involved with the Swim/Sail Program since he was 8 years old. While home is Rocky River, Pat has just finished his junior year at St. Louis University. He spent the last half year studying abroad in Galway, Ireland. Pat's sailing experience comes from the Put-in-Bay sail program and from representing PIBYC at Junior Race Week for four years. He brings to the program an important appreciation of summer life on the island and eagerly anticipates another great summer working with your children.

Coralee Skoch, better known as C.C., is also excited to be returning to Put-in-Bay Community Swim Sail for her 4th summer. She has just finished her junior year at Salve Regina University in Newport, RI where she is a Music and Secondary Education double major, and a member of the varsity sailing team. Her sailing experiences range from racing Lasers at local, national and world levels, to collegiate F.J. and 420's, to racing big boats for her entire life. She competed 6 years at

Jr. Bay week in F.J's and Lasers, placing highly in both the championship and commodore series. She also was awarded the Art O'Hara Female Sportsmanship Trophy in her last year of junior sailing.



Megan Riddle just finished her second year at the College of Charleston in South Carolina where she now sails as a skipper on the varsity sailing team. Her progression through the ranks there is not surprising given her prior history at the helm. Her sailing career started at the Vermilion Boat Club Sail Camp where she enrolled as soon as she was eligible as an eight year old. Loving it from the start, she progressed through the beginning sailing program to the more advanced levels, acquiring numerous sailing awards along the way. Now at the college, sailing throughout the school year with just a short break between Thanksgiving and New Years has meant a lot of time on the water to continue to learn and solidify what she knows.

In addition to her own sailing, Megan has taught sailing for the past three years at VBC and especially enjoys teaching the young kids. The first impressions of sailing for beginning sailors depend so much on the quality of their early experiences. Megan has been able to effectively impart to them her own love of sailing as well as her knowledge of the sport. And she has been well liked and respected by the kids at VBC, many of whom are sure to miss her.

SAILING: WHAT YOU NEED

1. Properly fitting life jacket with name clearly marked and a plastic whistle attached.
2. Closed toe shoes (preferred) that will get wet. The hybrid water/tennis shoes that are getting so popular are perfect.
3. Sun protection: hat or visor, sunscreen applied before arriving, and lip balm.
4. Clothing that will keep you warm when wet. Polyester dries fast and is better than a sweatshirt.
5. If your child gets cold easily, send warm, dry clothes to change into.
